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90 The Faculty of Extension

In 1912, the University of Alberta was a young institution under the Presidency of Henry Marshall Tory, who charged his protégé, a young AE Ottewell, with the task of “bringing the University to the people.”

100 years later, the Faculty of Extension continues to create opportunities for lifelong learning in response to the needs of individuals and society by engaging the university and communities in learning, discovery, and citizenship. What once were traveling libraries, “magic lantern” shows, and free public lectures in far-flung rural Alberta is today a multi-faceted, research-driven agent of community engagement, locally, nationally, and internationally.

The Faculty of Extension works collaboratively with other Faculties and educational institutions, community and professional associations, business organizations, and public agencies. It promotes responsive university-community engagement through a wide range of innovative learning opportunities, community-based research, and citizenship activities.

The Faculty now delivers over 700 courses annually to 8,500 students; 25 percent of whom are international students. Programs and courses are offered in the areas of aboriginal health promotion, academic English, adult and continuing education, applied sciences, communications and technology, fine arts, humanities, information access and protection of privacy, land use planning, local and regional governance, management, modern languages, research and evaluation, residential interiors, teaching and learning in higher education, writing, editing and publishing.

Students benefit from the expertise of more than 300 experts in their fields, whose real-world experience dovetails with the research performed by the 19 members of the professoriate. This research, principally in the areas of communication, social sciences, linguistics, community development, and non-traditional learning, has established Extension as a world leader in the Scholarship of Engagement (an academic domain that ties our historical mission with the vision for the future of the University of Alberta at large).

In the 21st century, the communities the Faculty engages reach far beyond the campus and province to a much larger global “community of communities” that are more diverse in their cultures, perspectives, needs, and issues than those that our predecessors addressed. As the University pursues and advances the process of community-university engagement, we recognize that Extension has unique perspectives, ongoing expertise, and a special role to play in informing and advancing that process.

Extension students, our partners in learning, benefit by earning credentials, completing studies in their preferred schedules and delivery, advancing their careers, and enriching their lives. Beyond this, their commitment to continued education benefits their communities by synthesizing new ideas and increasing productivity and innovation in a knowledge-based economy.

94.1 Adult Education

The Certificate in Adult and Continuing Education (CACE) program provides professionals with the opportunity to enhance their competencies associated with the design, development and delivery of adult education and training. The certificate is comprised of 8-10 courses. Seminars and workshops offered in the CACE program are relevant to various occupations including instructors, trainers, staff development officers, counsellors, group leaders, curriculum designers and human resource professionals. The Certificate in Occupational Health and Safety helps prepare candidates for registration as a Canadian Registered Safety Professional with the Board of Registered Safety Professionals, and assists Registered Occupational Hygienists maintain registration with the Canadian Registration Board of Occupational Hygienists and the American Board of Industrial Hygiene. The Certificate in Human Resources Management is for anyone working in human resources, as well as for individuals working in, or aspiring to fill, a supervisory role. This certificate comprises eight courses which cover: managing organizational change, business place ethics, interpersonal communication, maintaining healthy labour relations, organizational behaviour, and interviewing techniques. Participants review current challenges and issues to gain greater understanding and effective strategic thinking applied to the day-to-day operation of the human resources role. The Certificate in Information Technology Management was designed in consultation with information technology practitioners, business managers, and industry experts. 94.4 English Language Program

The English Language Program offers

- (1) Credit English as a Second Language (ESL) courses in the English for Academic Purposes (EAP) program, covering several levels.
- (2) Noncredit ESL courses in Intensive Day Program (IDP), covering a wide range of levels.
- (3) Part-time English language courses delivered to groups of continuing education, undergraduate and graduate students, scholars and members of the community. These courses are designed to provide targeted language support in areas such as writing, pronunciation and speaking skills.
- (4) Short-term, customized programs of study, delivered year-round to groups of students, scholars and professionals who are native speakers of English, often in cooperation with other Faculties and Departments on campus. These programs are designed to improve not only English language skills, but often other related academic or professional competencies

The English Language Program is a key partner in the University of Alberta Bridging Program. This program provides students with the opportunity to combine university degree courses with English for Academic Purposes (EAP) classes, allowing qualified applicants to improve their English Language Proficiency. As part of the Bridging Program, the English Language Program also delivers support courses such as Bridging Program 101, Introduction to Literature and Introduction to Science.

The English Language Program is an official testing centre for both the IELTS™ test (International English Language Testing Service™) as well as the TOEFL® iBT™ (Test of English as a Foreign Language - Internet-based test). Through a combination of online and face-to-face teaching methods Government Studies programming provides a unique opportunity for government administrators throughout Canada to connect and share ideas and expertise. The Government Studies unit works closely with local government associations (elected and appointed), federal and provincial government departments, the University of Alberta, and other postsecondary institutions. 94.5.1 Local Authority Administration

The National Advanced Certificate in Local Authority Administration (NACLAA) Level I and II programs focus on the fundamental theories relating to the ideas, structure, and processes that define local government administration. This two-level certificate program is offered entirely online and available to local government administrators across Canada. The NACLAA Level I credential is equivalent to the Local Government Certificate program (LGP) and requires completion of eight courses. Level II requires four additional courses. Completion of both the NACLAA Level I (LGP) and Level II, fulfils the educational requirements for the provincial professional designation of Certified Local Government Manager, which is conferred by the Society of Local Government Managers of Alberta. 94.5.2 Applied Land Use Planning

The Certificate in Applied Land Use Planning is designed for practicing professionals involved in municipal planning development and bylaw enforcement. The applied and academically-based curriculum provides solid theoretical grounding while ensuring that practitioners can apply theory to practice. Land use planning is based on a multidisciplinary body of knowledge

including: planning, geography, landscape architecture, environmental science, and use of Geographic Information Systems. The certificate is comprised of 8-10 courses. A combination of face-to-face and online instruction is used in delivering the program. Liberal Studies programming promotes social and individual enrichment through cultural awareness and appreciation with an emphasis on developing critical thinking, creativity and communication. 94.6.1 Fine Arts

This area of Liberal Studies includes opportunities to explore a variety of techniques in drawing, design, and painting. Students may audit classes of interest, complete a series of non-credit courses for general interest, or work towards a Fine Arts Certificate. Fine Arts programs offer students studio instruction with professional artists as well as access to studio space outside of scheduled class times.

94.6.1.1 Fine Arts Certificate

The Certificate in Fine Arts is an entry-level program that provides instruction in the techniques and skills of drawing, painting and design. It is comprised of 10 courses. Professional artists provide critiques and help in building a portfolio reflective of the learner's artistic vision and mastery. Fine Arts courses can also be taken for general interest. This area of Liberal Studies includes opportunities to participate in a number of general interest courses in Chinese (Mandarin), French, German, Italian, Japanese and Spanish at a variety of levels or work towards a Spanish Language Certificate. The focus is on the development of language proficiency through the four language skills: speaking, listening, reading and writing with a greater emphasis on oral communication. The cultural, historic and social aspects of the various languages provide learning contexts.

94.6.2.1 Spanish Language Certificate

The Spanish Language Certificate is comprised of seven courses. Applicants must have a high school diploma or equivalent. Students with previous knowledge of Spanish may sit a placement examination to determine their appropriate entry level. 96.4 Teaching and Learning in Higher Education

This Post-baccalaureate Certificate in Teaching and Learning in Higher Education provides participants with the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for effective teaching within institutions of higher education. Drawing on current research within the fields of teaching, learning and assessment in higher education, participants will critically apply the conceptual, theoretical and practical frameworks needed to engage reflectively and critically on the relationships among philosophies, theories and methods of teaching and learning in postsecondary contexts.
